

The Regular Council Meeting was called to order by Mayor Bruce Armstrong at 7:01 p.m. in the Haysville Municipal Building, 200 West Grand Avenue.

Roll was taken by Recording Secretary Rebecca Treadwell: Kanaga, here, Ewert, absent, Slocum, here, Holub, here, Pierce, here, Wilkerson, here, Crum, here, Hampton, here.

Invocation was given by Reverend Steven Dezotell, Church of the Nazarene.

Mayor Bruce Armstrong led everyone in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor Bruce Armstrong presented for approval the Minutes of April 28, 2008

Motion by Crum – Second by Hampton

Mr. Mayor, if there's no discussion, I'll go ahead and make a motion that we approve the minutes from April 28, 2008.

Kanaga yea, Slocum, abstain, Holub yea, Pierce yea, Wilkerson yea, Crum yea, Hampton yea.

Motion declared carried.

Under Citizens to be Heard Mayor Bruce Armstrong presented Tom Gibson.

Tom Gibson, PRIDE, thanked Council for approving them again this year. Gibson stated PRIDE committee was getting ready to do their seventh annual City wide clean up. Gibson showed pictures from the last years clean up. Gibson stated he appreciated the volunteers that helped. Gibson stated in the past they have used thirty to fifty volunteers per weekend to accomplish the job. Gibson stated he hoped that someday the number of trash permits would go down. Gibson stated they sell anywhere from 650 to 675 trash certificates every year. Gibson stated they are always looking for additional volunteers. Gibson stated they take hundreds of tons of trash out of the community every year and will continue to do so as long as the community supports them and the City supports the activity. Gibson showed a picture of the front of the trash certificate. Gibson stated the cost was a ten dollar donation. Gibson stated they come and pick it up; all the citizens had to do was take it to the curb. Gibson stated west of the railroad tracks was June 7th and the east side of the tracks was June 14th. Gibson stated they would meet both mornings at the Masonic lodge. Gibson stated they had agreed to open the first and second Saturday of the month to serve breakfast. Gibson stated PRIDE furnishes all of it. Gibson stated the first Saturday they would have lunch at the Senior Center and the second Saturday they would have lunch at the Activity Center. Gibson stated it all seems like a lot of work, but the volunteers all seem to have a good time. Gibson showed a picture of the back of the certificate. Gibson stated on the back was some of the do's and don'ts. Gibson stated citizens have to post the trash certificate where it could be seen. Gibson stated they would appreciate things kept as light as possible. Gibson stated it had to be curb side by 7:00 a.m. and sorted. Gibson stated they would not accept any normal household waste; they would not empty your trash cart. Gibson stated they would pick up one of each washer, dryer, water heater, or dishwasher. Gibson stated they would not take anything that has

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or had refrigeration in it. Gibson stated they would not take tires, vehicle batteries, cement and asphalt, landscape timbers or railroad ties. Gibson stated on the back of the certificate there were numbers where those things can be disposed of. Gibson stated on May 31st the Sedgwick County Hazardous Waste material will be in town to pick up paint, pesticides, oil, and any hazardous chemical laying around. Gibson thanked Lies Trash Service for helping them every year. Gibson stated the trash certificates were sold for ten dollars a piece. Gibson stated out of that amount, one dollar goes to the Friends of the Library. Gibson stated the trash certificates could be purchased at the library or True Value Hardware. Gibson thanked the Activity Center, Senior Center, and the Haysville Times for all they do to help. Gibson asked that everyone purchase their own certificate and not have their families bring their trash into town for this. Gibson stated this was for Haysville to clean up, not anyone else. Gibson stated the money earned goes back to the community. Gibson stated the Christmas decorations, yard of the month, and the holiday house are funded by this. Gibson encouraged everyone to volunteer. Gibson stated without the volunteers in the community a lot of things wouldn't be done. Gibson stated the circles at the corner were built primarily with volunteers, the Christmas decorations that are put up, and the banners on the streets were all done by volunteers. Gibson stated they were always looking for volunteers. Gibson stated if you wanted to be a member of PRIDE you can be a member. Gibson stated they would send the members an e-mail of events going on. Gibson advised they meet the first Thursday of every month at the Senior Center. Gibson stated there was no cost to be a member, just a little bit of time.

Mayor Bruce Armstrong stated they need to approve the paying of tipping fees. Armstrong stated this was one thing the City does because it is not up to the trash hauler to pay the fees.

Motion by Hampton – Second by Wilkerson

I'll make a motion that we approve the tipping fees for both June 7th and June 14th for this PRIDE clean up days.

There were no Licenses and Bonds on the agenda.

Councilperson Steve Crum asked if this resolution states they are approving the improvements but the School District is actually paying for the improvements.

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Mayor Bruce Armstrong stated that was correct and the City was paying twenty percent of the street.

Motion by Crum – Second by Hampton

If there's no discussion on this resolution, I'll go ahead and make a motion to approve this resolution determining the advisability of the making of certain internal improvements in the City of Haysville, Kansas; making certain findings with respect thereto; and authorizing and providing for the making of the improvements in accordance with such findings for the paving and drainage improvements of municipal parking lot.

Kanaga yea, Slocum yea, Holub nay, Pierce yea, Wilkerson yea, Crum yea, Hampton yea.

Motion declared carried.

Mayor Bruce Armstrong presented A RESOLUTION DETERMINING THE ADVISABILITY OF THE MAKING OF CERTAIN INTERNAL IMPROVEMENTS IN THE CITY OF HAYSVILLE, KANSAS; MAKING CERTAIN FINDINGS WITH RESPECT THERETO; AND AUTHORIZING AND PROVIDING FOR THE MAKING OF THE IMPROVEMENTS IN ACCORDANCE WITH SUCH FINDINGS (PAVING & DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENTS-MIMOSA STREET).

Mayor Bruce Armstrong stated the City had agreed to pay twenty percent of the Mimosa Street.

Councilperson Ken Hampton asked if it was decided how they would pay for this. Mayor Bruce Armstrong stated it would come out of the highway fund reserve. Hampton asked if they were going to stretch it out over years. Armstrong stated they were going to pay cash for it.

Motion by Kanaga – Second by Slocum

Mr. Mayor, I'll make a motion that we approve a resolution determining the advisability of the making of certain internal improvements in the City of Haysville, Kansas; making certain findings with respect thereto; and authorizing and providing for the making of the improvements in accordance with such findings; paving and drainage improvements on Mimosa Street.

Motion declared carried.

Under Notices and Communications Mayor Bruce Armstrong asked for Governing Body Announcements

Councilperson Rob Wilkerson advised May 13th was the Senior Advisory Board, every Wednesday was Panera bread, May 16th was a movie matinee, and May 19th they had Harris Foot Care Clinic. Wilkerson stated they would be having a CPR class on May 21st. Wilkerson thanked Police Chief Mike McElroy and the Police Department for the participation they had for DARE. Wilkerson thanked Johnna Crawford for her involvement in the reading at the library.

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Councilperson Steve Crum stated the Hometown Market starts May 13th from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. and every Tuesday after that. Crum stated they would be having different types of entertainment each time. Crum stated anyone can go to the City's Website and get a list of events scheduled. Crum stated there would be three different times over the summer when the Humane Society would bring animals down that would be available for adoption. Crum stated the Wire house would also be open on Tuesday's from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. Crum stated the Arbor Day Tree Planting went well and they received a nice tree. Crum stated the Park Board meetings were the first Monday of every month and used to be held at the City Building but they were being moved to the Public Works building. Crum stated they would still be the first Monday of every month at 5:15 p.m. Crum encouraged everyone to take their kids to the library to sign up for reading programs and activities over the summer.

Councilperson Ken Hampton stated there was an opening on the Utility Committee for any Councilmember that was interested.

Mayor Bruce Armstrong presented a Memorandum from City Clerk/Treasurer Beverly Rodgers Re: Heidi L. Hitch – New Hire.

Mayor Bruce Armstrong presented a Memorandum from City Clerk/Treasurer Beverly Rodgers Re: Sherry Satterfield – To Full Time Employment.

Mayor Bruce Armstrong presented a Memorandum from Police Chief Mike McElroy Re: David Melcher – Police New Hire.

Mayor Bruce Armstrong presented a Letter from Sarah Kauffman, Cox Communication Re: Additional Channels.

Mayor Bruce Armstrong presented a Letter from Sarah Kauffman, Cox Communication Re: Additional Channels.

Under Other Business Mayor Bruce Armstrong presented a Consideration of Patrol Vehicle Replacement.

Police Chief Mike McElroy stated on three of the bids, the vehicles were not in stock and it could be anywhere from a twelve to fifteen week delay and there was some concern the delay could be longer.

Councilperson Steve Crum asked if the one it would be replacing was still in service. Police Chief Mike McElroy stated it had 151,000 miles and they have tried not to put any large maintenance items on the vehicle. McElroy stated it could last three more months or it could fail in two weeks, but it is in service at the current time. Councilperson Ken Hampton asked if it would be a problem again of getting the equipment on the car. McElroy stated to his understanding, all of the equipment for the vehicle would either come with the vehicle or it is already in stock. McElroy stated whenever they look at one vehicle they buy the equipment for the next vehicle so they are a vehicle ahead on replacement items.

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Motion by Pierce – Second by Wilkerson

Mr. Mayor and Council, I move that we go ahead and accept the bid from Shawnee-Mission Ford for \$24,729.00.

Motion declared carried.

Mayor Bruce Armstrong presented a Consideration of Agreement with PEC Re: South Turkle Drainage Improvements.

Rod Young, PEC, stated these contracts came out of the CIP plan they helped the City with the last couple of years. Young stated it is indicated the scope of services is for the work on Turkle Avenue on the south part of town between 5th and 7th streets. Young stated there were two valley gutters in Turkle Street and they are supposed to drain to the east to a twelve to eighteen inch pipe to the railroad. Young stated the contract will modify Turkle so it would drain to the inlets and then move through a storm sewer back to the railroad. Councilperson Ken Hampton stated on the prices they had a contingency of fifteen percent and then there was a project cost of twenty five percent which is forty percent more than what they think the project was going to cost. Young stated the project cost at that time was for CIP which was a budget number, and now they have a contract for \$8,800 which would be a lot less than what was in there. Mayor Bruce Armstrong stated this project would come out of the storm water funding.

Motion by Hampton – Second by Crum

I'll make a motion, Mr. Mayor, that we approve the contract between PEC and the City for the South Turkle Drainage Improvements.

Motion declared carried.

Mayor Bruce Armstrong presented a Consideration of Agreement with PEC Re: Timberlane Drainage – Grand Avenue to Timberlane Drive.

Rod Young, PEC, stated this was another project out of the CIP plan. Young stated the drainage project was north of Grand Avenue and West of Mimosa Street. Young stated Public Works Director Randal Dorner did the first piece with their assistance. Young stated this was a continuation of that same project. Councilperson Joe Holub asked when these projects would begin. Mayor Bruce Armstrong stated he would like to set them so they would be done this year with the first payment coming due in 2009. Councilperson Ken Hampton asked about the Timberlane drainage going all the way down the 1200 feet, if once it hits the ditch in the road, if it would be a project down the road to continue that over to the Riggs Park pond. Armstrong stated they looked at leaving that ditch open the way it is now because it's grassed and seemed to be working well. Armstrong stated what was not working is behind all of the houses.

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Motion by Hampton – Second by Crum

I'll make a motion that we approve the contract agreement with PEC and the City regarding the Timberlane Drainage, Grand Avenue to Timberlane Drive project.

Kanaga yea, Slocum yea, Holub yea, Pierce yea, Wilkerson yea, Crum yea, Hampton yea.

Motion declared carried.

Mayor Bruce Armstrong presented a Consideration of Agreement with PEC Re: Haysville Library Waterline Extension.

Rod Young, PEC, stated they submitted plans to City staff and the Fire Department and received comments back from the Fire Department after the bid opening and the award of the contract. Young stated Sedgwick County Fire Department requested a waterline extension for fire service down to the new library. Young stated it was just a water main extension from South Main to the library. Councilperson Ken Hampton asked if both the water line extension and the contract with PEC were coming out of the library bond money. Mayor Bruce Armstrong stated that was correct.

Motion by Crum – Second by Wilkerson

Mr. Mayor, I'll make a motion, if there's no more discussion, I'll make a motion that we go into agreement with PEC regarding the Haysville Library waterline extension.

Kanaga yea, Slocum yea, Holub yea, Pierce yea, Wilkerson yea, Crum yea, Hampton yea.

Motion declared carried.

There was no Old Business on the agenda.

Mayor Bruce Armstrong asked for Department Reports.

Director of Governmental Services Carol Neugent showed a video from the HAHS appreciation day. Neugent advised May 2nd the City was host to over one hundred students and staff from the Haysville Alternative High School for the first ever "Survivor Haysville Challenge Course and Picnic". Neugent stated Survivor Haysville was the City's way to express appreciation for the 1,100 plus hours of community service provided by HAHS students and staff. Neugent stated the challenge course was designed around City functions; meter readings, backhoe rodeo, mechanical aptitude, gator course, sobriety test chalk line, and various recreational activities. Neugent stated the students were split into twelve teams, who then competed to win the title of top survivors. Neugent stated individual awards were also given for the best backhoe time and gator proficiency. Neugent stated in 2006 the HAHS administration thought it would benefit their students to experience community service in a positive way. Neugent stated, starting with that school year, four community service days were scheduled. Neugent stated the City embraced the partnership that not only benefits the students, but provides the City with numerous hours of much appreciated community service during the school year. Neugent stated this year they had three community

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service days and the City again gained from those hours provided by the students and staff. Neugent stated students painted offices, provided landscaping services, planted trees, helped with recreation activities, spruced up the Senior Center, interacted with seniors, washed equipment and vehicles, clean drying beds, painted hydrants, and provided general cleaned up to many areas throughout the City. Neugent stated the HAHS community service days have been so successful that they now plan specific maintenance and improvement activities those days.

Councilperson Ken Hampton asked if the Commissioner had sent the \$25,000 for the Senior Center. City Clerk/Treasurer Beverly Rodgers stated he had, and the money had been invested.

Police Chief Mike McElroy introduced visiting officer Sergeant Scott Holton. McElroy advised that the past Friday was their DARE end of the year celebration. McElroy stated they had 385 students in this year's DARE courses. McElroy stated for the DARE celebration they had 216 students attend, which was about 56%. McElroy stated they had a wonderful time and there were many activities there. McElroy stated the DJ had them do different games and dances. McElroy stated they provided pizza and pop for them. McElroy stated Mr. Crum and Mr. Wilkerson were there to help. McElroy showed various pictures from the event.

Public Works Director Randal Dorner gave updates on Council Action Requests. Dorner advised KDOT has started on the East Grand project. Dorner stated there were 105 KDOT working days; depending on the weather and holidays it should stretch out about four months. Dorner stated they are cleaning out the ditch on the south side of the road; then they will fill that with dirt and make a shoofly along the south side. Dorner stated they planned to have that done by next week. Dorner stated with that the traffic would go to the new lane and the far south lane right now. Dorner stated once the traffic is diverted to there, they think it will take about a month to put in the storm sewer and then do the street work on the north side. Dorner stated once the traffic is to those two lanes, Cain Drive will be closed to traffic. Dorner stated part of Plaza Drive will be closed off also during phase one. Dorner stated once that is done it will shift to the south side of the road. Dorner stated he would give updates as things progress on the project. Mayor Bruce Armstrong asked if they were going to do dirt only or if they were going to put asphalt on the other lane. Dorner stated they would put asphalt on the lane. Dorner advised he hoped to get more information on the household hazardous waste before the next Council meeting. Dorner stated the limb drop off recycling down at Public Works would be open on the third Saturday of the month from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Dorner stated they would be inspecting every load because they have been getting a lot of tires and TVs lately. Dorner stated they do take limbs, grass clippings, leaves, concrete, or metal. Rod Young stated they went to look at the Alexander situation but it was submerged from the rain. Young stated he thought it might have been an offset joint in the crossroad pipe, but he thinks now it is nothing more than a beaver den. Young stated he and Dorner had talked about methods to fix it. Young stated once the water recedes they would go back out and look at it. Young stated he didn't think it was as big of

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concern as he first thought. Young stated, regarding the water situation at Howard Cook's house, they talked at a meeting and a possible alternative would be to have a sample of what was dug out of the screens. Young stated he first thought it could come from the well field, but he and Dorner talked and the wells pump to a clear well and then it is drawn out of the clear well so it would be tough for the sand to be dumped into a tank and picked back up in a tank. Young stated it could come from tuberculation from the older water mains in town. Young stated as the County does fire hydrant flow tests the higher velocity knocks off some of the roughness on the inside of the pipes, which could be the problem. Young stated it could have come from repairs. Young stated he guessed it was from tuberculation from the fire hydrant flushing. Young stated if he could get a sample he could probably tell where it is coming from. Councilperson Ken Hampton stated he had noticed someone had placed white sandbags along the culverts of the Country Lakes pumping station on Meridian and 79th. Hampton stated he was concerned when they first put that in, that being 1800 to 2000 gallons a minute, that some would migrate north. Hampton stated it appears that it has migrated north last time he saw it pump into Mr. Curless's field. Hampton asked if that was why those sandbags were there. Young stated this was a temporary fix. Young stated the County is still pursuing an open channel similar to what is behind the wastewater plant to take the water south. Young stated they knew there would be some clean up requirement in the ditch along Meridian. Young stated the County hadn't had a chance to get out there to clean it because of the rainfall. Hampton asked, until the County cleans the ditch, if they could do something with the pump to lower the output and the volume so it doesn't flood. Young stated his staff had been down with the City on this several times. Young stated they had closed valves to reduce the flow. Young stated right now it is just trying to get it drawn down and have dry weather so the County can clean the ditch. Hampton asked how high the lakes were right now. Young stated this past Friday it was about a foot and a half. Dorner stated before all the rain it was down close to two foot to a foot and a half. Councilperson Joe Holub stated he would like to have a real answer on what is wrong on Alexander. Young stated as soon as the water drops they would have an answer.

Recreation Director Georgie Carter reminded everyone the pool opens on May 24th. Carter stated pool passes, ticket books, and swim lesson registrations are being taken at the Activity Center. Carter advised when the pool opens, everything would be done there. Carter stated a citizen had contacted her about starting a running club and anyone that is interested in finding someone to run with to contact her.

Mayor Bruce Armstrong presented for approval an Executive Session Non-Elected Personnel for 15 minutes.

Motion by Pierce – Second by Hampton

Mr. Mayor and Council, I move that we move into an executive session regarding non-elected personnel for a period of fifteen minutes, attendees to include Council and the Mayor.

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Kanaga yea, Slocum yea, Holub yea, Pierce yea, Wilkerson yea, Crum yea, Hampton yea.

Motion declared carried.

Council went into Executive Session at 7:50 p.m.

Council returned from Executive Session at 8:06 p.m. Mayor Bruce Armstrong announced there was no binding action taken.

Motion by Hampton – Second by Crum

Mr. Mayor, I'd like to make a motion that we have another executive session for non-elected personnel not to exceed ten minutes.

Kanaga yea, Slocum yea, Holub yea, Pierce yea, Wilkerson nay, Crum yea, Hampton yea.

Motion declared carried.

Council went into Executive Session at 8:07 p.m.

Council returned from Executive Session at 8:19 p.m. Mayor Bruce Armstrong announced there was no binding action taken.

Under Appointments Mayor Bruce Armstrong presented Municipal Judge – Greg Keith.

Motion by Pierce – Second by Crum

Mr. Mayor and Council, I move that we allow the appointment of Greg Keith as our Municipal Judge.

Councilperson Ken Hampton stated they didn't have a lot to do with the Municipal Judge and asked if there were any complaints from the City Attorney or Chief. City Attorney Alison McKenney Brown stated she didn't and she respects the work he does. Councilperson Rob Wilkerson stated he agrees with her some but he disagrees with her on certain instances of a personal nature. Wilkerson stated he thought he was a little soft on some of the crime. Wilkerson stated there was one dog still loose that shouldn't be.

Mayor Bruce Armstrong presented City Attorney(s) – Alison McKenney Brown (Primary) & Lee Parker (Secondary).

Motion by Pierce – Second by Kanaga

Mr. Mayor and Council, I move that we approve the appointment of Alison McKenney Brown as our primary City Attorney and also Lee Parker as our Secondary City Attorney.

Councilperson Ken Hampton asked if they renegotiate the City Attorney's contract. Mayor Bruce Armstrong stated it comes up annually in the budget. City Attorney Alison McKenney Brown stated the contract runs from January 1 through January 1 and it continues year to year as long as neither party asked to renegotiate it.

Crum asked if there was any way to prevent people from going through people's trash when they put it out for the City wide clean up and taking the metal. Crum stated the City has been able to recoup some of the expenses from the metal but last year most of it was gone before they could pick it up. City Attorney Alison McKenney Brown stated the way the law works on solid waste is that once it's moved to your curb, it is considered trash. Brown stated the rules of trash are that it is abandoned property. Brown stated the right to control it lawfully ends. Brown stated it would be very difficult to get an enforceable rule about protecting what has been put out as abandoned.

Councilperson Rob Wilkerson stated that Waste Connection and Waste Management are speeding through his neighborhood and wanted to know if there was anything they could do to make them be more courteous. Mayor Bruce Armstrong stated they have had the problem in the past and they have met with them and let them know. Police Chief Mike McElroy stated they had run radar in the area and at that time they were not speeding.

Councilperson Joe Holub asked about the force main on the Curless farm. City Attorney Alison McKenney Brown stated it was settled. Public Works Director

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Randal Dorner stated he was currently reviewing the plans. Mayor Bruce Armstrong asked if they were past the time for filing protest. Brown stated she believed it was. Holub asked why there was a safety fence around the merry-go-round at Riggs Park. Dorner stated he would check on it and get back to him.

Mayor Bruce Armstrong asked for a motion to adjourn.

Motion by Pierce – Second by Wilkerson

Mr. Mayor and Council, I move that adjourn tonight's meeting.

Kanaga yea, Slocum yea, Holub yea, Pierce yea, Wilkerson yea, Crum yea, Hampton yea.

Motion declared carried.
